Hartford's Historic Properties ~0ver 5,000~

- 36 Districts on the National Register of Historic Places
- 5 Districts on the State Register of Historic Places
- 3 Local Historic Districts
- Multiple Resource Areas (multiple similar buildings such as Sacred Places and Firehouses)
- National Landmarks: Colt Industrial Complex, Mark
 Twain House & The Old State House
- 88 individual properties such as 56 Arbor former Underwood Typewriter, Bulkeley Bridge, Spring Grove Cemetery and the Phoenix "Boat Building"
- We estimate a further 2,000 would qualify to be listed as Historic Properties
